Discussion questions

- 1. What did you learn about hearing aids from this talk?
- 2. What questions do you still have about hearing loss or hearing aids?
- 3. Have you had a humorous moment when you were misunderstood by someone?
- 4. What's the most frustrating thing about hearing loss for you?
- 5. How do you explain to someone that you can't hear or fully understand everything when you are out at events, services, etc.? Or do you not say anything, or bluff?
- 6. How would you describe your first assistive listening system experience? (hearing loop, FM/RF, or infrared)
- 7. Do you always ask to use an assistive listening system when you attend events, services, etc.? Why or why not?
- 8. Why is it important for people to provide feedback, reviews, and advocacy for assistive listening systems in public spaces? Does someone have a success story they'd like to share?
- 9. What do you think is the most important point in the video?
- 10. What's one thing you can do to help someone with hearing loss today?
